#### Annual Congregational Meeting Minutes – March 5<sup>th</sup>, 2023

#### 12. Call to Order by Terri Lunsmann

#### 13. Devotions provided by Pastor Angie from Lenten Devotion booklet based on John 3:1-2

#### 14. Establish a Quorum & Appoint Tellers

A Quorum was established with Sara Campbell and Bruce Christenson designated as tellers.

#### 15. Additions and Approval of the Agenda

Lonnie approved agenda as submitted, Brent Bublitz seconded, motion carried

#### 16. Council Elections

Dave Beaulieu nominated Lonnie Ellefson, Erin Kaiser Deborah Schmalz and Sandi Christenson for council. Ashley Sempf seconded the motion and the motion carried.

Carol Johnson asked how many positions are to be filled? It was noted that we need at least two positions to be v. We can fill up to six positions.

Sarah Campbell asked for clarifaction of the term period. It was noted that the term ends in February, so the new council will begin the term in the March meeting.

Bruce Christenson moved to close nominations and cast a unanimous ballet for the nominated candidates. Ashley Sempf seconded the motion and the motion carried.

#### 17. Sanctuary Piano

A brief review of the need prepared by Julie Reimer and included in the meeting materials was presented. It was noted the Foundation will be willing to cover part of the estimated \$12,000 cost for the new piano but has recommended us to consider a fund raiser to cover the remainder. Pastor Angie noted that we have received an anonymous donation of \$5000.

Don Ellefson asked why someone who would want to buy our piano if it can't be fixed. Julie Riemer explained that the current piano would still be good in a utilitarian program, such as a dance studio or elementary school.

Cheryl Pepper commented that organ has more issues. It was noted that repair of the organ will need to be added to a council agenda for discussion.

Brent Bublitz asked if the Foundation has been formally approached and was informed that a formal request cannot take place until approved by council. Having an approved motion at this meeting will allow presentation to Foundation.

Joel Dittlefsen suggested taking money from the Parsonage fund with Terry Lunsmann recommending against this approach until a formal plan for parsonage money is developed.

Sara Campbell provided a fundraiser suggestion for an amount for purchasing one of the 88 keys on the piano.

Brent Bublitz made a motion to move forward with a fundraiser and after completion seek request from foundation.

Debi Korsan and Ben Wheeler seconded the motion and the motion carried.

#### 18. Sidewalk / Concrete Work on Joy Lutheran Property (Reference 3 options in Meeting Material)

Brent Bublitz asked whether the foundation been approached and was informed that a formal request has not been made but the Foundation is aware of this need.

Debi Korsan asked whether the Foundation has been asked how much they will contribute. It was noted that the Foundation would not provide an amount at this time.

Ashley Sempf suggested that if we don't ask for money by the piano, they may provide more. Brent Bublitz noted that the money is available from the foundation but that this request would be treated separately from the piano.

Joel Dittlefson inquired about the amount of money is available from the Foundation and was informed that there is >\$80,000 that is "touchable".

Sarah Campbell asked about the purpose of the parsonage money and was informed that the use of the parsonage funds needs to be addressed by council. Council's recommendations regarding the use of funds in this category will need to be presented and approved at a congregational meeting. It was noted that the funds are in an savings account and earning interest.

Sandi Christenson noted that the fear of using parsonage money is unwarranted. If it is something we need, use of these funds should be considered. Pastor Angie noted that the mission of the church is to be alive and share the good news with others...the money isn't ours to keep.

Elizabeth Ebensburger made a motion to approach the Foundation for half of \$25,000 [Option 3] and use cash on hand to pay for the remainder of the expense. This motion was seconded by Ben Wheeler and the motion carried.

#### 19. Food License Purpose / Status

Our Food license in process and will require an inspection before issuance.

#### 20. Committee Sign-Up

Congregational members were encouraged to sign up for committee participation.

#### 21. Adjournment

Ashley Sempf made the motion to adjourn. This motion was seconded by Jerrry Livingston, Todd Sturgel and Brent Bublitz. The motion carried.

#### **PASTOR ANGIE'S 2023 REPORT**

Dear Friends in Christ,

Every year during Epiphany we choose Star Words. The idea is that whatever word we choose becomes our word for the year. That throughout the year we will be on the lookout for how our word is showing up, is playing out, in our individual lives as well as our collective lived experience. Over the years I have had some pretty good words. Interesting words. Words I could work with. That is, until Epiphany 2023, the year the Star Word entered my life.

Now, **tough** is a fine word, a good word, a necessary word, of course, but wasn't a word I would choose to spend a year being on the looking out for, nor a word I would invite into my life or my call. In fact, I tried choosing another word, then another word, but the more I chose the worse they got. So, I embraced my **tough** word, and I paid attention, listened, and learned a lot about toughness in the process.

According to Mirriam Webster Dictionary, **tough** means: difficult, hard, stressful. 2023 had its share of difficult, hard, and stressful moments. The reality of life in this world is that we can't escape tough moments. We have grieved the deaths of people we love; said good-bye to our Intern, Kristin Boland; and voted to give a large portion of the proceeds of the parsonage sale (\$120,000) to the Feed My Neighbor Food Pantry in Centuria. None of which was easy. The word **tough** also means strong, resilient, determined, to persevere, to endure, which is the kind of tough I associate with Joy Lutheran Church. As we wrap up our 4<sup>th</sup> year of ministry together, I am mindful of your toughness, and thankful for the Holy Spirits challenge to be the church you know you are called to be. Even when the challenge is uncomfortable or scary. Your strength, determination, and faithfulness to the Gospel allowed us to put action to the promises of our vision statement: "to serve our community and God's world by; faithfully welcoming and including all people, serving and meeting the needs of poverty and hunger, striving for justice and peace in the world, and gathering together as a JOYful community to be refreshed and sent".

Your strength, determination, and faithfulness meant another year of welcoming friends and strangers to the Font and the Table. Throwing our doors open meant the community could gather, hospitality could be practiced, love could be shared. 2023 brought changes to staff and the birth of a children's choir. Together generations worshiped, children led, and disciples

studied. Of course, we wore pajamas to worship, and collected donations for the Community Referral Agency. Noah (as in the guy who built an ark in the desert, AKA Bruce Christiansen) showed up on Wednesday nights during Lent to help us better understand the story and God's promises. We LOL'd on Holy Humor Sunday, and tapped our feet during the ukulele services. We saw our gift of \$120,000 to Feed My Neighbor inspire another anonymous gift making it possible for the pantry to purchase a building of its own. The Quilting Ministry took on a life of its own this year, making and giving more than 80 quilts, many of which went to Feed My Neighbor. We participated in God's Work Our Hands, resumed Faith5, taught Confirmation and First Communion, and Lutheran 101 classes. Whew! That's a lot of vision living, Joy! Thank you for being tough and for being faithful. Lives have been changed, burdens have been lifted, people have been welcomed, friendships have been made, and hungry people have been fed because of your strength and determination. It is an honor and privilege to be your pastor and to minister, love, and journey alongside such an amazing community. I look forward to 2024 and all the Holy Spirit will reveal to us. Are you ready? Get set. Go!

It is time for your congregation's annual meeting! This is a great opportunity to reflect on the past year of faithful ministry. Now is the time to ask the BIG questions! How were we faithful in in ministry? How were we faithful in participating in God's simple mission to love our neighbor? Now is the time to celebrate how God's Spirit has inspired your ministry! Give thanks to God and celebrate for the good that your congregation has accomplished!

Now is also the time to tell the truth about your ministry. How has your congregation fallen short and not been faithful to God's will? Lacked energy, a sense of purpose or mission? Now is the time to humbly tell the truth if your congregation has lost its focus or has little energy for God's work.

We all need to take an honest look in the rear view mirror of the last year and ask how have we been faithful and how have we failed to be faithful to our baptismal promises. Then we can boldly move into the New Year 2024 asking how we can with God's help do better.

The Church of England took a long look into the rear view mirror and with much prayer has discerned that moving forward they will strive to be a Simpler, Humbler and Bolder Church in the future. The Church of England described their vision for the future in this way:

Simpler, humbler, bolder are virtues we believe God is calling from us at this point in our history. They run through the vision and shape all we do and all that we are.

- Simpler because we are not as big a church as we used to be
- Humbler because we are facing our failures, and this is not easy.
- Bolder because the love of Christ compels us. We have a gospel to proclaim, and we live
  and minister in a world of much pain and confusion.

I believe these three virtues could also help us in the coming year. I invite your councils and leaders to lean into these questions in 2024:

- 1. Simpler: How can we simplify our structure so more time and energy can be spent on loving our neighbors and joining in God's mission in our community? How can we focus on what is really important and let go of the trivial or unnecessary?
- 2. Humbler: What isn't working? How have we fallen short? We can't do everything we use to do so what ONE thing can we do for Jesus? How can we work with other churches, denominations in our community?
- 3. **Bolder**: How can your congregation be braver and bolder in sharing the good news about Jesus in a hurting world? In prophetic witness to justice issues in our world? In working for right relationships with our neighbors and all of creation?

I thank my God for every remembrance of you, always in every one of my prayers for all of you, praying with joy for your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now. I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work in you will continue to complete<sup>[c]</sup> it until the day of Jesus Christ. Philippians 1:3-6

<u>Philippians 2</u> Do nothing from selfish ambition or empty conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. Let each of you look not to your own interests but to the interests of others. Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he existed in the form

of God... emptied himself ...he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death— even

death on a cross.
